# FBO COVID-19 Response Summary

**Objective:** To inform potential areas for faith collaboration with WBG client country offices around the COVID-19 response, particularly around **community engagement**

**Context:** Faith actors uniquely engage local communities and governments, through their **reach** and **trust**, and make effective partners in responding to pandemics such as HIV, Ebola, Cholera and now COVID-19. This report is a high-level summary of information from **142 Faith-Based Organization (FBO)** leads on their COVID-19 response efforts.

## Response to COVID-19 Overview

Faith actors have been at the forefront of the response, advocating for efforts to flatten the curve and leveraging their reach and trust at the country level to mitigate impacts of the pandemic. The following highlights key actions FBOs have taken by priority area with emphasis on how WBG can engage with this strategic stakeholder group at the country level.

## Lessons Learned from Previous FBO Responses

Faith Actors have been at the forefront of recent epidemics and are applying lessons learned to the COVID-19 response. A few notable examples include the following:

- **Ebola:** The 2013 Ebola Outbreak in West Africa led to 28,000 people being infected, and more than 11,000 deaths in Sierra Leone, Guinea, and Liberia. Because of their influence, trust and reach, engaging the faith sector was a critical factor in changing the tide of the epidemic due to their role in changing traditional burial practices, leveraging their networks to provide health services, and disseminating accurate information.<sup>1</sup> Utilization of such faith networks in the COVID-19 response will be key to prevent and control the spread of the pandemic.
- **Malaria: Nigeria Interfaith Action Association (NIFAA)** was one of the implementing partners for the World Bank's \$180 project to improve access to and utilization of mosquito nets in Nigeria. Leveraging the fact that 98% of Nigerian citizens are religious, NIFAA trained Muslim and Christian leaders to encourage increased utilization of nets. In Akwa Ibom State, this resulted in twice as many children under five (51.6%) sleeping under a net in comparison to nearby Anambra State (25.1%) where no faith leaders were trained.<sup>2</sup> Understanding the trust and reach of these faith leaders was key to elicit effective behavioral change at the community level, and this approach can be adapted for COVID-19 activities such as handwashing and social distancing.
- **HIV/AIDS:** In 2018, **PEPFAR** announced a \$100m investment to address key gaps in HIV Epidemic Control, particularly referencing the importance of involving FBOs due to their demonstrated ability to elicit behavioral change and influence social norms at the community level. An example of FBO impact includes support of the **Coptic Orthodox Church** in Kenya to provide HIV prevention, treatment, and support services each year to over 125,000 people living with HIV in two facilities-Nairobi and rural western Kenya.<sup>3</sup> Applying lessons learned from such engagement will be critical in the COVID-19 response.

## FBO Advocacy Efforts

FBOs have been leading advocacy campaigns and hosting dialogues/webinars to promote sharing of knowledge and best practices during the response. Notable campaigns and events by focus area include:

<b>Debt and Funding</b>	A <a href="#">letter from Eurodad</a> on behalf of over 150 CSOs/FBOs was sent to Bank-Fund leadership calling for the permanent cancellation of all developing country external debt payments due in 2020. Signatories include interfaith advocacy networks <b>Jubilee Debt Campaign (UK)</b> , <b>Jubilee German</b> , and <b>Jubilee USA</b> .
	<b>Jubilee USA</b> is <a href="#">petitioning the IMF</a> to deliver aid, cancel debt, and help mitigate economic and health impacts of pandemic ( <b>Christian Aid</b> is among one of the <a href="#">signatories</a> ). They, along with <b>U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops</b> , have also <a href="#">urged President Trump</a> , to take action.
	<b>Christian Connections for International Health</b> signed on to <a href="#">a letter urging the U.S. Administration to maintain funding</a> for the World Health Organization and encouraged CCIH members to sign as well.
	<b>World Renew</b> has supported collective action in policy and lawmakers correspondence to encourage increased and targeted foreign aid/funding to match needs of COVID-19 responses. This includes being a signatory of the Canadian Council for International Cooperation's <a href="#">letter to the Canadian Minister of International Development</a> sent on April 3 <sup>rd</sup> , 2020.
<b>Economic Livelihoods</b>	<b>Catholic Relief Services</b> is the co-lead of the <a href="#">Collaborative Cash Delivery Network</a> , which is involved in COVID-19 related advocacy as it relates to Social Protection and the critical role of Cash Assistance. They are connecting with WBG's Social Protection team to explore potential collaboration around this programming.
	<b>Bread for the World</b> is planning a convening with key actors in the Washington DC global food security and nutrition space to discuss food insecurity as a result of COVID-19.
<b>WASH</b>	The <b>Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development</b> <a href="#">announced</a> that a strategy is being defined to address WASH in healthcare facilities belonging to the Catholic Church.
	<b>Water Mission</b> has been involved in <a href="#">WHO/UNICEF advocacy campaign for improved WASH in healthcare facilities</a> .
<b>Climate</b>	<b>The UN Faith for Earth Initiative</b> co-hosted a <a href="#">virtual dialogue</a> with Sida, Stockholm International Water Institute and the Swedish Environmental Protection Agency on March 16-18 around the coronavirus pandemic, climate change and biodiversity loss, and the role of moral duty bearers such as faith actors and indigenous groups.
	Inger Anderson, Executive Director of the <b>UNEP</b> , and Azza Karam, Secretary General of <b>Religions for Peace</b> , <a href="#">called upon citizens</a> to consider how treatment of the planet's natural resources has had a hand in causing the COVID-19 pandemic. Faith leaders are pushing for action to address such environmental concerns, and their authority will be crucial to impact behavior of people globally.
	WBG's Connect4Climate team and <b>Earth Day Network</b> had digital outreach around Earth Day in April (50th anniversary this year), including interaction with faith community starting with a Global Faith Dialogue on April 6th.
	<b>Christian Aid</b> is advocating for a global recovery plan that addresses climate issues and <a href="#">human rights acceleration</a> in localization efforts.
<b>Social Protection and Vulnerable Communities</b>	<b>Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS)</b> have shifted their annual <a href="#">Capitol Hill Advocacy Campaign</a> attention to protect vulnerable populations, particularly refugees and prioritize education for children among forced migrants.
	<b>Arigatou International</b> has launched a campaign titled <a href="#">Faith in Action for Children - Responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic</a> that aims to mobilize religious communities and child protection actors to work together to keep children safe.
	The <a href="#">Collaborative Cash Delivery Network</a> is advocating in the social protection space, notably around the <a href="#">Grand Bargain</a> Initiative (WBG is a signatory), a unique agreement between some of the largest donors and humanitarian organisations who have committed to get more means into the hands of people in need. They also launched an <a href="#">advocacy paper</a> on social protection and humanitarian cash.

<b>Messaging and Overall Response</b>	<b>Pope Francis</b> addressed the crisis <a href="#">in an interview on March 20</a> where he conveyed hope that the crisis will bind humanity together. He emphasized the need for everyone to work together and urged no distinction between believers and non-believers impacted by the pandemic.
	<b>The World Health Organization's EPI-WIN Initiative</b> have <a href="#">released COVID-19 guidelines</a> targeted at faith actors to prevent misinformation and promote consistent messaging at the country level. The <a href="#">EPI-WIN Initiative</a> provides tailored information for audiences during a public health event like COVID-19 to prevent misinformation and promote consistent messaging.
	<b>Georgetown University's Berkley Center</b> , in partnership with the <b>World Faiths Development Dialogue</b> and <b>Joint Learning Initiative</b> , have launched a <a href="#">platform</a> to collect and communicate information related to religious actors responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, organizing the information so that it can be quickly found and used by development policymakers and practitioners and religious actors who seek to work together in the COVID-19 response.
	<b>World Hope International</b> rolled out their <a href="#">Get-Support tool</a> , which is being utilized by 35 community organizations across the US, CAN, AUS, and DEU as of 3 April, representing over 40,000 people. Users can submit and respond to requests for assistance.
	The <b>Joint Learning Initiative</b> , partnered with <b>UNICEF</b> and <b>Religions for Peace</b> , have launched a <a href="#">Multi-Religious Faith in Action COVID-19 Campaign</a> through RfP and UNICEF's regional and country offices.
	<b>The International Partnership on Religion and Sustainable Development (PaRD)</b> reviewed <a href="#">challenges for religion/faith actors and communities – responses from the field</a> in a webinar including WBG participation.
	<b>The G20 Interfaith Forum</b> <a href="#">released a statement</a> highlighting urgent topics for the attention of G20 members, notably the need for collaboration and coordination with faith actors to address immediate and long-term impacts of the pandemic
	<b>United Nations</b> Secretary General Antonio Guterres <a href="#">appealed to religious leaders</a> of all faiths “to join forces to work for peace around the world and focus on our common battle to defeat COVID-19.”
The <b>UN Inter-Agency Task Force on Religion and Sustainable Development</b> has released a <a href="#">joint statement</a> with the endorsement of the <b>IATF Multi-Faith Advisory Council</b> to express its concern about the challenges presented by the pandemic and called upon stakeholders to work together through a “whole-of-body, human-centered approach.”	

## Examples of FBO Response Efforts

Below are a few examples from strategic FBO partners of their efforts on the ground:

- **Catholic Relief Services** is working in **Guatemala and Mexico** with partners that manage several shelters along the migrant routes and on the U.S.-Mexico border to improve awareness and adjust procedures for safety and prevention.
- **Catholic Medical Mission Board** is working with **Haiti's** national and communal ministries of health to produce communication materials in Creole and have supported COVID-19 trainings for more than 1,000 healthcare providers and community health workers. Their Medical Donations Program is working to rapidly procure and deploy critical equipment and supplies.
- **Cordaid** is supporting Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) in preparation for an economic downturn, including provision of loans to SMEs through their partner Micro-Finance Institutes. They also offer financial and technical support to keep businesses running and provide liquidity to temporarily cover fixed costs.
- **Corus International** is working in northern **Iraq** to support agricultural improvements and access to clean water. In **Kenya**, they are providing infection prevention and control training, as well as PPE, for key staff of the Christian Health Association of Kenya.
- **Episcopal Relief & Development** partner **Episcopal Church of the Philippines** is mobilizing local assets and resources to meet PPE and food needs, engaging community members from vulnerable households to sew masks and paying labor costs to provide an income stream.
- **Islamic Relief USA** is working in **Yemen** to raise awareness, distribute ready-to-eat meals and hygiene kits at quarantine centers, and provide dignity kits on a needs basis.
- **IsraAID** has been implementing child protection programs in **Kenya's** Kakuma Refugee Camp since 2011, and is utilizing local community networks within the Camp to raise awareness about COVID-19 and promote handwashing. They are also providing malaria testing kits and distributing food supplements to combat rise of malnutrition and malaria cases, which may exacerbate impact of COVID-19 on health facilities.
- **Samaritan's Purse** has sent emergency field hospitals fully staffed to 2 of the epicenters of the outbreak, including a 68-bed respiratory care unit in **Cremona, Italy**.
- **The Vatican:** Cardinal Turkson, First Prefect of the **Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development**, has been tasked to lead a Vatican COVID-19 Response Team. The team is composed of 5 working groups with focus on 1) evidence-building; 2) addressing long-term challenges (e.g. economic impact); 3) advocacy (e.g. debt relief); 4) communications/ consistent messaging; and 5) fundraising to help mitigate immediate needs.
- **World Hope International** developed the **Get-Support** platform to foster and accelerate community organization responses to COVID-19 related needs across their memberships. Through this tool, users can submit and respond to requests for assistance.
- **World Relief** works with networks of over 3,000 local churches in Africa and has developed tools and resources to support their ability to engage communities through Social Behavior Change Communicates that leverage the Church's unique leadership and community trust to prevent COVID-19.
- **World Renew** is working with the **United Church of Zambia**, which operates a number of healthcare facilities, to provide protective equipment to frontline healthcare workers, promote hygiene practices to reduce transmission, and improving triage of patients to reduce potential spread.
- **World Vision International**, through its microfinance arm **Vision Fund International**, is expecting to deploy \$172 million for recovery loans for rural and urban microbusinesses, expanding loans to savings groups, immediate liquidity for microfinance operations, and investment in digital data and mobile banking to reduce in-person contact in lending practices.
